WHAT TO BRING

A Checklist of Important Documents You Need to Help Complete the FAFSA

Social Security card or number

- Your parents' social security numbers and birth dates (plus year)
- Date and year your parents were married, separated or divorced
- Your 2016 income information
- Parents 2016 income information
 - adjusted gross income
 - amount made by each parent
 - amount of income tax
 - number of exemptions
- Any records of untaxed income such as welfare benefits, Social Security benefits, or child support payments
- List of colleges you are interested in attending

Who is considered a parent? <u>"Parent" refers</u> to a biological or adoptive parent. Grandparents, foster parents, legal guardians, older siblings, and uncles or aunts are **not** considered parents on this form unless they have legally adopted you. In case of divorce or separation, give information about the parent you lived with most in the last 12 <u>months.</u> If you did not live with one parent more than the other, give information about the parent who provided you the most financial support during the last 12 months or during the most recent year you received support. If your divorced or widowed parent has remarried, also provide information about your stepparent.

For signature and security purposes, FAFSA requires students and one parent to create an FSA ID.

You may want to create the FSA ID a few days BEFORE filing. Create the FSA ID at <u>fsaid.ed.gov</u>
